## Q and A on Social Security

Each month, the Social Security Administration provides some common questions and answers that may apply to you or your family. If you have any questions you would like to be answered, call the Social Security Office at 1-800-772-1213.

**Q: I am planning on getting married later this year and may change my last name. If I do, how would I go about getting my name changed on my Social Security card?**

*A: To report a name change, you will need to fill out an "Application For A Social Security Number" (Form SS-5). You will have to show proof of identity under both your old name and your new name. You can download the application at [www.socialsecurity.gov/online/ss-5.pdf](http://www.socialsecurity.gov/online/ss-5.pdf). You can also get the form from any Social Security office or by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778). Your corrected card will have your new name and the same Social Security number as your previous card. It is especially important that your Social Security record shows your correct name, since your employer reports your earnings under the name you provide. Social Security provides this service free of charge.*

**Q: My son is disabled and is receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI). One of his uncles recently died and left him some money—not a lot, but more than he has ever had before. Does this mean that his SSI payments will stop?**

*A: Your son should contact Social Security and report the inheritance. The money he inherited is considered income for the month it was received and it could make him ineligible for payments that month. But you should also know that to receive SSI an individual cannot have more than \$2,000 in resources. Your son may want to talk to a Social Security representative about the inheritance before he decides what to do with it.
